DRINKING WATER WARNING - BOIL YOUR WATER BEFORE USING

The Borough of Chambersburg Water System May be at Increased Risk from Microbial Contamination.

The Borough of Chambersburg routinely monitors the conditions in the distribution system. On **Wednesday, September 23, 2026**, there was a loss of positive water pressure due to the lowering of a water main. A loss of positive water pressure is an indicator of the potential existence of conditions that could allow contaminants to enter the distribution system through back-flow by back-pressure or back-siphonage. As a result, there is an increased chance that the water may contain disease-causing organisms.

Who is affected?

Customers and users served by the Borough of Chambersburg Water System on S. 5th Street (between Cumberland Avenue and Highland Avenue) and Cumberland Avenue (between S. 5th Street and S. Coldbrook Avenue).

What should I do?

DO NOT DRINK THE WATER WITHOUT BOILING IT FIRST. Bring all water to a rolling boil, let it boil for one minute, and let it cool before using; or use bottled water. You should use boiled or bottled water for drinking, making ice, washing dishes, brushing teeth, and food preparation until further notice.

Inadequately treated water may contain disease-causing organisms. These organisms include bacteria, viruses, and parasites, which can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea, and associated headaches.

These symptoms, however, are not caused only by organisms in drinking water, but also by other factors. If you experience any of these symptoms and they persist, you may want to seek medical advice.

People with severely compromised immune systems, infants, and some elderly may be at increased risk. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. What happened? Water will be shutoff in order to lower a section of water main to create clearance for another utility.

What is being done? A third-party contractor will be lowering a section of water main, which involves cutting into the existing water main, requiring the issuance of a Boil Water Advisory.

We will inform you in writing, via another written notice when all corrective actions have been completed and when you no longer need to boil your water. Typically, this advisory will be in effect for approximately 48 hours.

In sharing or posting of this Advisory with others, please ensure that other parties are affected by the issue – the Borough of Chambersburg has the ability to limit the affected service population by isolating portions of its main – as listed in the “Who is affected?” portion of this advisory.
